Jesus said "Abba," a familial term for "father," but today some people use more expansive language for God, such as "Dear One," "Beloved One," or "Father and Mother of us all."

Which Father?

Who art (is)
in heaven,
(Be specific when
you talk to God.)



Our translation of the
Lord's Prayer dates back
to the 1500s, when
Shakespeare's English
was popular.

Hallowed (Holy) be Thy (your) name.
God is holy, separate, worthy of worship.

Thy (your) kingdom come,
Thy (your) will be done,
on earth as it is in heaven.

What is God's deep hope? What does God want for the world?

The Petitions

Each part of the prayer asks for God's help in a different way — to sustain, forgive, help, and protect us.

Give us
this day
our daily
bread.

Forgive us
our debts
as we forgive
our debtors.

And lead
us not into
temptation
but deliver us
from evil.

Some congregations use the
following:

Forgive us our trespasses
as we forgive those
who trespass against us.

or
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those
who sin against us.

In Aramaic, the language Jesus spoke, the word
for "debt" and "sin" is the same. "Trespasses"
comes from a 1395 English translation by
John Wycliffe.

The Lord's Prayer
combines the prayers
Jesus taught his disciples
in Matthew 6:9–13 and
Luke 11:2–4. While
individual words have
changed, the church has
prayed the Lord's Prayer
for centuries. The Lord's
Prayer provides a model
of how to pray.



For thine (yours) is the
kingdom, and the power, and
the glory forever (and ever).
Amen.*

*Not all faith traditions add these closing words of praise (doxology).
